

2nd F-ENS Summer School

Dear F-ESN member,

We are planning to organize the second F-ESN Summer School, to be held in Berlin from August 29 to September 1, 2016. The general theme will be “ Science in the Ward”. For further details see the program below.

We are asking you to open a call for applications within your society as soon as possible. Applications should be sent with a CV and a brief statement of interest, to the Secretary of the F-ESN, Mervi Jehkonen (mervi.jehkonen@uta.fi).

The ideal candidates will be graduate students in their final years of PhD, or early post-docs, as well as clinicians at a comparable level of career. The Organizing Committee (Stefano Cappa, Sergio Della Sala, Erik Hessen and Mervi Jehkonen) will make the selection. In principle, we will accept 2-3 students from each society, taking into consideration the size of the society and the total number of applications. A total of 40-50 participants will be accepted. The deadline for applications is **March 23, 2016**. The names of the successful candidates will be communicated by March 31, 2016. Should a society not wish to fill their quota of participants, the available posts will be reallocated to other societies, who are therefore invited to fill “reserves”.

The F-ESN is going to cover most organization expenses (venue, speakers). This means that the selected students will have to pay only a 150 euros’ participation fee, their own travel and maintenance, we will make sure that the latter will be as cheap possible. National societies are encouraged to provide financial support to their students if possible.
